

Tokyo Dome Hotel

Tokyo Dome Hotel opened as a flagship of the Tokyo Dome Hotels on June 1st, 2000.

Located at the very center of Tokyo's round-the-city JR Yamanote Line, the Tokyo Dome Hotel is an ideal base for business, leisure or sightseeing. Close to some of Tokyo's most historic neighborhoods, the Hotel is also just ten minutes away, by car or subway, from the business and financial districts of Marunouchi and Otemachi.

Tokyo Dome City, where the Hotel is located, is one of the Tokyo metropolitan area's biggest entertainment districts and includes the 55,000-seat Tokyo Dome, the entertainment complex LaQua, the compound facility MEETS PORT, attractions, sports and fitness facilities, and multi-purpose halls. As a member of the City, the Tokyo Dome Hotel has multiplied the City's opportunities and has enabled the staging of large-scale conventions, incentive parties and trade shows. It has also helped the City attain its long-range objective of incorporating the three concepts of "Watch," "Play" and "Stay"; the Hotel of course targets the third concept.

Thanks to its superb location, the Tokyo Dome Hotel aims to combine full entertainment elements with true relaxation.

Designed by KENZO TANGE ASSOCIATES Urbanists-Architects (currently known: TANGE ASSOCIATES), the strong lines of the Hotel's tower, softened by gently curving surfaces, give the Tokyo Dome Hotel a sleek modern feeling. Its exterior, made of light and dark gray ceramic plates and permeable and reflective glasses, is a palette that reflects the sky and city, changing with the time and seasons. With 43 floors above ground and 3 below ground, the Tokyo Dome Hotel towers at a height of 155 meters above the city and has a total floor area of 105,856.6 m², which includes 1,006 guest rooms, 8 restaurants & lounges, 18 small to large banquet rooms, chapel and other wedding facilities, a business center, a child care room, and an outdoor pool.

There are three Tokyo Dome Hotels nationwide: the Tokyo Dome Hotel, Tokyo Dome Hotel Sapporo in Hokkaido (opened in 1988, change of name in 2011), and Atami Korakuen Hotel in Shizuoka (opened in 1965).
